Locator Kiosk, which will allow visitors to find the location of niches in the Columbarium. The Locator will consist of gray granite slabs, approximately 4 feet high,4 feet wide, and 2 feet deep. Included in the Locator will be a 32 inch wide, outdoor, waterproof, high brite visibility, 4g ram solid state touch screen display device. It will allow for access to visitors' remote WiFi devices and allow visitors with these devices to carry the information around the Columbarium. The Alumni Association intends to include similar data for the Naval Academy cemetery in the future. Signcraft which did work on our 50th Offertory structure will be responsible for construction beginning in February. The Locator is expected to be completed by May 1.We will dedicate the Locator with a plaque to honor our classmate Steve Burgess, who made the largest contribution to the overall \$1,959,000 Class of 1959 Columbarium Project. The cost of the locator will be \$95,000. We expect to hold a dedication celebration of the Locator during a home football weekend this fall.

As you well know, throughout the year we buy tickets for the Wounded Warriors and their families to attend the Chargers and Padres games. For many it is the first time they have ever seen a professional game. I have received numerous thank you notes from these individuals who truly appreciated the opportunity to attend.

On Friday we all went to Balboa Naval Hospital and were given a tour of the incredible advanced technology equipment and facilities that we now have to assist our men and women who have lost limbs in Iraq and Afghanistan to learn to live reasonably normal lives. We had the chance to meet one particular amputee who demonstrated how well his artificial leg worked. Incredible!

On Saturday we all gathered at a restaurant owned by a Rich Carlquist USNA '80 where we all watched Navy beat up on SMU. (Looks good for the Army game!)

But on Sunday was the real main event. We hosted five Wounded Warriors, three Marines and two Navy medics, to a banquet in Coronado where they were honored by the Mayor of Coronado and his council, as well as about 20 school children who came in and sang Patriotic songs. They also made up posters thanking these men for the sacrifice to our country. But the heart wrenching and tearful moment was when these men had the chance to speak and tell of their trials. There was no whining. No Crying. They all said how proud they were to be Americans and they would do it all again if given the chance. One Marine said people often ask him how he lives with his handicap. He said he always tells them, "The only handicap anyone has is a bad attitude."That brought a standing ovation. I was truly moved by all of this ceremony.

I had the privilege of sitting next to a man who had become a naturalized citizen from Spain and felt he owed it to his new country to serve in the military. He had served in Iraq for two months when his left leg was blown off. He had no regrets and told us all at the table how proud he was of the US. Thank God we have folks like these five who are willing to defend our country at such risks to their own lives.
