U.S. Naval Academy Class of 1961

Distinguished Graduate Recognition On 7 June 1961 the Naval Academy graduates entered their armed forces selection to protect and defend the constitution of this great nation. These graduates would later be recognized as the Vietnam Generation, which lost a political war in Vietnam due to a flawed strategy and poor leadership in Washington, DC. As Rear Admiral Hill, a 1961 graduate and future Superintendent of the Naval Academy stated at a Class of 1961 dedication ceremony, we were never recognized by this divided nation for the commitment, lovalty and sacrifices of our classmates upon return from this war disaster. Several of our 13th Company classmates believe it is time to recognize the extraordinary service of these dedicated patriots and warriors, members of the great Class of 1961.

- John Maye Quarterman Jr., a native of Brunswick, GA, was an outstanding student and All State football player. He entered the Naval Academy in July 1957, excelled in football and lacrosse, leadership and academics, and upon graduation chose a career in naval aviation. A distinguished career followed that lasted 30 years, including major command assignments, 756 combat missions, recovering astronauts, 5000 plus flight hours in 61 different aircraft, number 2 test pilot in the U.S Navy, and retiring as a Captain with many service commendations. Let us share a few of these commendations:
- 1. Silver Star As a helicopter fire team leader he directed the successful recovery of a pinned down Seal Team with casualties, and a downed helicopter team, while under insurmountable heavy enemy fire twenty-five meters away.
- 2. Legion of Merit (2)- Successful command of Amphibious Squadron FOUR and Director of the Fleet Operations and Readiness Division for his leadership, expert judgment, and inspiring devotion to duty.
- 3. Meritorious Service Medal-Leadership and execution of the Grenada Rescue Mission and the successful evacuation of civilians and U.S. Marines from Beirut.
- 4. Distinguished Flying Cross-Leadership and successful extraction of Seals and wounded personnel surrounded by Viet Cong, under heavy fire, and adverse flying conditions, on two separate occasions on the same day
- 5. Others: Bronze star with Combat V, 31 Flight Strike Medals, Navy Commendation with Combat V, Vietnamese Air Gallantry Cross, Military Times Hall of Valor, and other unit, campaign, and service awards
- 6. In 1983, he hosted Bob Hope's tour for the troops, and gave up his stateroom to Bob. When Bob pulled down the covers there was a sign "Bing Crosby Slept Here". John became life long friends with Bob and Delores, with many fond memories and reunions.
