I receive the following rom **Harry Butler (10)** and **Ed Clexton (10)** recalling how we are tied together sometimes years later.

From Harry to Ed: Recently we had a birthday celebration for one of our 55+ community residents who was turning 101. He's Marine Colonel who fought in the Pacific in WWII. The party was organized by his American Legion Post, and a number of the Post members attended. In the crowd, there was a guy with a USS Eisenhower CVN 69 baseball cap.

I went up to him and asked if he had sailed on the Ike. He said yes. I told him that my Naval Academy roommate (if I had said 'wife', I don't think he would have understood) was **Ed Clexton (10)**, who had been Skipper of the Ike. He told me that you were the CO when he was aboard. Turns out he was an enlisted nuke who could speak French, and Ike was to be off the coast of Normandy for the 40th anniversary of the D-Day invasion. He was called to the bridge to meet you, and you gave him a handful of

'I Like Ike' buttons to give to the French. It's a small world. Hope you and Catherine are doing well.

"I'm glad he had his IKE hat on!
Every day at sea I would have a
"nuke of the day" spend the day
with me on the bridge and where
ever else I was going except lunch.
They were selected by their Division
Officers and rotated by Division. I
did that to try to maintain what I
learned in Rickover school. Apparently he wasn't one of those, but I'm
glad he answered the call for French
speakers before we went into Brest.

It ended up a problem when the French cancelled our entry on a Saturday. It then turned out to be the only time I ever asked the crew to tell me what to do. I took a poll and asked should we wait another day and go in for 2 days, or should we just go home?

I wanted to go in and the skippers of USS Virginia and USS South Carolina, my 2 escort CGNs, who were both senior to me, said whatever I want was ok with them.

First I polled the Engineering and Reactor Depts, avg age 28, mostly married: they said "go home". the only reason we were there for the 40th anniversary of D Day at Normandy was we (3) had just finished a deployment and were in stand down, but when I heard about this event I went to Air-Lant and said "respectfully, Sir, you should send IKE, not JFK, to Normandy". I mean, come on, D Day/Eisenhower" and he said "Ed, since you asked, I agree with you".

I then, polled the Air Wing, avg age 24 and they said "go in, albeit a day late."

So, how to break the tie? Did I forget to tell you Naval Reactors in DC wanted us to go in because there hadn't been a nuke ship in France since DeGaulle took over! I then went on the 1 MC to the flight deck, avg age 19. We waited a day and went in on Sunday; the stores were all closed but the bars were open. so, that's how decisions are made in Naval Air. Ed"
