Dear Classmates, Wives, Widows, and Guests,

We are delighted you can join us in celebrating our 65th reunion, which will begin Thursday afternoon (August 28th) with an inspiring visit to the Terwilliger Center for Student-Athletes. This will be followed by a welcoming reception at the hotel later that evening.

Friday will be a full day, starting with a service in the Chapel to honor those of us who have already weighed anchor for distant shores, followed by a buffet lunch at the O'Club, an update on recent developments at the Academy by the Superintendent, a parade on Worden Field, and a Battalion or Company Party.

Saturday morning will provide an opportunity to catch your breath and spend leisure time with classmates prior to witnessing Navy's first contest of the football season on the heels of last year's stellar performance. The day will conclude with a banquet and class meeting in the new Alumni Association and Foundation Center. Sunday will provide a bit of frosting on the cake as we brunch with the Mids in King Hall.

Most of what follows you have seen before, but there are several differences and additions that deserve to be highlighted. In no particular order, they are as follows:

- The bus schedule has changed.
- 2. Contrary to earlier expectations, because the Class of 2010 will be using a pricey stadium facility for their tailgate, there will be an associated charge of \$150 to access the site. Accordingly, instead of interacting with them at their tailgate as originally planned, we will visit with them immediately following the Superintendent's briefing and as we both make our respective ways to seating on the parade field. In other words, we will have close to a half hour with them in a more formal setting before the briefing and this time afterward for informal interaction. If anyone would like to attend the 2010 tailgate despite the added cost, please let me know right away at (202) 203-8360, and we'll take steps to make it possible (leave a voicemail).
- 3. At the parade, our reserved seating will be in the bleachers on the far side of the reviewing stand, electing shade over proximity. 2010 will be sitting on the near side, but in the sun. However, you should feel free to sit on whichever side you prefer when the time comes. Wherever you choose, you will need to be in your seats by 1545. The USNA Parachute Team and the Brigade Silent Drill Team will be performing before the parade begins.
- 4. At the **banquet**, everyone will be assigned to a table for two reasons. First and foremost is the fact that we're at an age in which going deep with folks we've known for some time is a higher priority for most of us than making new acquaintances. So, although we will have attended our Battalion or company parties the night before, the banquet seating will also be arranged by company and/or battalion to the extent possible. The second reason is to facilitate the serving of those who have dietary

restrictions. Although tables will be pre-assigned, it will be open-seating once you get there. If anyone wants to trade tables with someone else on a mutually agreeable basis, please feel free to do so; but highlight the change to your waiter if anyone involved has a dietary restriction.

The banquet will take place in the Reinemund Family Conference Room on the main floor of the Alumni Center. As you enter, you will pass through the Pre-function Room where mixed drinks and non-alcoholic beverages will be served. In that room, you will see your name and table number prominently displayed on the overhead monitors (in addition to the seating chart enclosed in this package).

5. The final half hour or so of our banquet will be devoted to a sit-in-place **class meeting**, which will largely focus on honoring a number of folks who have devoted countless hours over the years to serving the class.

Hotel. The DoubleTree Hotel at 210 Holiday Court in Annapolis has been selected as our base of operations. Plentiful parking is available outside the hotel and is free of charge.

Check-In. Official check-in for the weekend will take place in the Harbor Room at the DoubleTree on Thursday, August 28 from 1400-1800 and Friday from 0730-0930. Any classmates who arrive without having previously registered will be expected to pay with check or cash, before checking in.

At check-in, each registered classmate will receive a tote bag with the following items:

Memorabilia. Since we are at the stage in life where one begins to divest rather than accumulate, there will be no memorabilia this time around. Reception. A welcoming reception will be held for all attendees on Thursday evening from 1830-2100 in the DoubleTree Main Sail Ballroom. Greet your classmates and enjoy drinks, beer, wine, or sodas at a cash bar. Heavy hors d'oeuvres will be served.

Memorial Service. The Memorial Service honoring our departed classmates will take place from 1000-1100 on Friday in the Naval Academy Chapel. Buses will depart at 0915 from the DoubleTree Hotel to the Chapel. Luther Alexander, a former Command Chaplain at the Academy, will assist in our tribute to those who have gone before.

Link in the Chain. Our Link in the Chain (Class of 2010) purposely chose the same weekend as us to celebrate their 15th reunion. Accordingly, we will be linking up with them on Friday immediately prior to and after the Superintendent's presentation in Alumni Hall.

Football. For folks with mobility issues who don't want to cope with the seating at the stadium, you should be able to watch the game from the restaurant at the DoubleTree. There are three large screens but rather limited seating, so you may want to get there on the early side. The game cannot be viewed from individual hotel rooms. The Navy football team uses the DoubleTree for dinner and rest prior to all home games, so you may run into some of them on Friday or Saturday.

Transportation. Bus transportation is provided between the hotel and the Yard for all scheduled reunion events. The buses will be clearly marked with Class of 60 on the front and side. Recognizing that some of us are beginning to lose a little spring in our step, we will have at least one bus in all of our travels that is equipped to accommodate folks who may require a bit of assistance along the way.

The bus schedule is attached. Please note that all buses will depart from the Conference Center entrance (on the left side of the hotel as you face the building).

Please try to be ready to board at least 15 minutes before the buses are scheduled to depart. Also, for the short distances between the Chapel, the O'Club, Alumni Hall, and the parade field, golf cart assistance will be provided for those who need it.

Bus transportation back to the hotel will be provided after the O'Club lunch for anyone who wants it.

Security Measures/Yard Access. Pedestrian access to the Yard requires a valid photo ID. It is suggested that you always carry a photo ID when you are away from the hotel. The reunion name badge by itself will not allow entry into the Yard. However, it is suggested that you always wear it whenever you are attending a function or going into the Yard.

Only vehicles driven by active-duty military, retired military with valid ID, or with valid handicapped decals/stickers will be permitted to drive onto the Yard. A photo ID is required for the driver and passengers. Parking within the Yard is extremely limited, especially during normal working hours.

Terwilliger Center for Student Athletes. For those who arrive early and would like to see it, two buses have been arranged to take you over for a short visit on Thursday at 1500 from the hotel. Dick Pariseau, a standout football and lacrosse veteran from the 1st Company, and Lew Hilder, a track star from the 5th Company, will ride the separate buses to provide a bit of context before you arrive at the Center. Once you arrive, there are any number of displays that will attract your interest, so feel free to roam as you wish. If you are unable to make this trip, we highly recommend you try getting there on your own if you can find the time. It's a short walk from Gate One. The buses will also stop at the Visitor Center, which is in close proximity to the Terwilliger Center.

Religious Services. The bus schedules on Sunday morning are timed so you can attend a religious service and also have brunch with the Mids if you'd like to do both.

Cost. In the interest of controlling costs, and recognizing that many of us have given up drinking, we have opted for cash bars at the reception, the O'Club lunch, and the Alumni Center Banquet. Please note that the costs associated with the Battalion and Company parties are to be paid separately at those functions.

Miscellaneous. In amplification of the gouge contents, please note the following:

- At the game, bus transportation will be provided at halftime for anyone who wants to return to the hotel at that time.
- The tour of the Alumni Center is not a formal tour but rather free time for you to walk around and familiarize yourselves with the layout and trappings of the new center. The bar will be open in the Pre-Function Room (to the left as you enter on the main floor) and you can tour the premises with drink in hand as the spirit moves. You and your guests should plan to be seated at your assigned table by 1830.

- Apparently, the outer doors to King Hall operate off of a key card, and aren't always monitored. Once inside, please keep an eye out for other classmates who appear later and may need you to open the door for them.
- Please do your best to start boarding the buses 15 minutes ahead of when they are scheduled to depart. Again, the buses can only pick you up and drop you off at the Conference Center entrance, which is almost directly below the Harbor Room where you will be registering and checking in. An elevator to take you there is right around the corner from the Harbor Room.
- Dress code for all events: As you think appropriate for the occasion.



As we are about to gather to celebrate our 65th Reunion, we also celebrate a remarkable class legacy that has developed over the years. Even more important, though, have been the bonds of friendship that have stood the test of time.

Because of the Covid-related cancellations of our attempts at a 60th, it has been ten years since our last opportunity to celebrate old ties in a major way. So, we have some making up to do. Adding to this challenge is the fact that this may be the last opportunity for many of us to reinforce those bonds, while honoring classmates who are no longer with us, especially those who gave their all in military operations.

In some respects, today's Academy is quite different from the Academy we left in 1960. It has become a co-ed institution, new buildings and facilities have been added, and the daily life of a Midshipman no longer includes marching to class or pulling out one's slide rule to ace a quiz in Steam. Despite the changes, the values remain the same, as does the Academy's mission. Midshipmen continue to serve the Navy and their country with honor, just as we did.

As for the legacy, we were the last class to fly the N39 "yellow perils" and the first class to enter Rickover's Nuclear Power Program directly after graduation. We were also the first class to report directly to Submarine School for service aboard submarines. Until 1960, all officers entering Sub School had to first qualify as officers of the deck on surface ships.

Our class made its mark on the fields of play as well, with 16 graduates inducted into the Navy Athletics Hall of Fame. They and other classmates played central roles in beating Army in football by the largest margin since the series began in 1890, winning National Championships in lacrosse and fencing, playing in the NCAA basketball championships, and representing the United States at the Rome Olympics in crew and fencing.

That success continued after graduation as well, with 24 ascending to Flag rank, two classmates awarded the Navy Cross, 12 the Silver Star, two the Distinguished Flying Cross, and 20 the Purple Heart. Some 28 others lost their lives in military operations, with five of those in combat.

No matter how you cut it, we are called "Super-Sixty" for a reason. It is the camaraderie borne of the above and countless other experiences over the years to which we will be paying tribute at our 65th. If the planets align—join us if you can.
