My name is Beauregard Lee, and I have had the wonderful opportunity to attend Marion Military Institute (MMI) as the recipient of the G. Thomas Mariano Jr. '60, USNA, Memorial Scholarship-an honor made possible by your extraordinary generosity. I will take the oath on I-Day as a member of the United States Naval Academy Class of 2029, and I could not be more grateful for the chance you have given me to make this dream a reality. I was initially hesitant about attending MMI. Having never been to the South, let alone Alabama, uprooting my life to attend a military junior college

was daunting. I hadn't heard of the Foundation program before being selected, and I was still processing the fact that I had not been directly accepted or rejected by the Academy. However. I committed myself fully to the opportunity. determined to make the most of this unique path and use it as motivation to earn my place at USNA. Even though my family and I were presented with multiple prep school options, I had heard positive things about MMI and believed it would provide the structure and preparation I needed. While the academic rigor was challenging, I leaned on my strong STEM background to succeed. Beyond academics, MMI introduced me to a foundational level of military life. The Intensive Training Cycle (ITC) during the summer, while grueling at the time, gave me a taste of the discipline and demands I can expect during Plebe Summer. The military science courses also gave me valuable technical insights and helped reinforce my understanding of service and leadership. Looking back, I am sincerely grateful for the year I spent at MMI. What I once feared might be a lost year became one of the most formative experiences of my life. I leave with a stronger mindset, better preparedness for life at the Naval Academy, and friendships with cadets bound for service academies across the country-bonds I know will last for years to come. 
