The 2025 football season opened 30 August with an easy 52-7 win over VMI. It was encouraging to see Coach Newberry putting in backup quarterback 2/c Braxton Woodson for the entire second half as he's our most likely starter next year. The first conference game ended (finally after a 2:06 inclement weather delay) with Navy vanquishing University of Alabama, Birmingham 34-24. A 42-23 comefrom-behind defeat of Tulsa put the Mids at 3-0 on the season. First year Director of Athletics Mike Kelly took over in June from Chet Gladchuk who served 24 years in the position.
